Fire Department acquires new equipment

Thanks to the CARES ACT, which provided COVID funds to approved entities, the Fire Department received \$65,000, which enabled them to make several upgrades. According to Chief Tom Tholen, these monies allowed them to purchase 10 new air packs, three sets of bunker gear, each costing \$2500, and a highly specialized washing machine costing \$3,500 designed specifically to handle laundering bunker gear.

Grade schoolers gain skills from new camp

Victoria youth in grades three through sixth recently had the opportunity to participate in a new basketball experience. Building Better Knights Basketball Camp was created by community member Sean Rodger, who wanted to see instruction in the fundamentals of basketball.

The program had nearly forty kids involved and was designed for indistrict players although Rodger had interest from parents in Russell and Hays as well.

The Saturday morning sessions were held at the elementary school and the Victoria Recreation Commission provided the equipment which included balls, cones and jerseys. Rodger expressed his appreciation to both USD 432 and the Commission for their support.

Rodger credits the success of the camp to the other coaches who volunteered their time: Dale and Danielle Windholz, Ryan Lichter, Jacquelyn Stoffel, Chris Teeter, Brooklyn Kuhn and Brinly Lichter. Each coach was responsible for teaching a 20-minute block on a specific skill and then each group rotated between those sessions. Skills focused on were ball handling, passing, shooting, and defense awareness. At the end of the camp, a competition drill between the kids tied all the fundamentals together.

According to Rodger, the camp's mission was "to introduce, build, and improve the foundation of the game through the teaching of fundamentals for the future of Victoria's young athletes."

Rodger hopes to continue building the camp in the coming years. Part of what he hopes his players learned is showing respect toward others, doing the right things, being coachable and working hard to achieve their goals.

He thanked the parents who brought their kids to camp and stated, "Hopefully, we'll see more and more kids in their driveways and at the playground working on what they have learned."
