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## City adopts new property tax plan

With assistance from the Grow Hays organization, the City Council recently passed a Neighborhood Revitalization Plan (NRP) for the City of Victoria. In a nutshell, if you apply for the NRP and are accepted, you can receive 70% of the City property taxes back for a 10-year period. That does not mean that the portion of your property taxes that goes to other entities will be returned, just the City of Victoria's share.

Here are the important details. If you make improvements to your property and the <u>assessed</u> value of your property increases by \$10,000.00, then you can receive 70% of your Victoria property taxes back. There are several forms that you will need to fill out before you begin your improvements, both at City Hall and at the Ellis County administrative building in Hays. For more details, please stop by City Hall, and the entire NRP can be explained to you in greater detail.

### **ATTENTION ALL UTILITY CUSTOMERS**

Due to an increasing number of customers' checks and ACH payments being returned due to insufficient funds, the Victoria City Council has adopted the following new policy effective immediately:

- The first returned check/ACH: a notice will be sent giving the customer five days to pay the NSF amount and a \$30 NSF fee, along with the bank charges incurred. Only cash, cashier's check or money order will be accepted.
- The second returned check/ACH: the customer's account will be subject to immediate disconnection without notice and the account will be placed on a CASH ONLY basis for 12 months. Any checks received during this time will be returned without being processed and the account will remain unpaid until cash, cashier's check or money order is received.

A copy of this policy with further details is available at City Hall.

## Black Knights host season finale




The Victoria Black Knights' football team hosted the championship game for their eight-man Central Kansas Football League on Saturday, Oct. 21. This league is comprised of players grades fourth through sixth grade and from ten communities. The Victoria team is coached by head coaches Nathan Schippers and Gus Pfanenstiel and assistants Curt Pfanenstiel and Steve Washburn. The Black Knights have 23 players.

This event capped off their season of six games with area teams. The championship game included five games, so nine teams visited Victoria.

To feed the visitors that day, two food trucks were engaged: TK's Smokehaus and Taco Riendo. A Victoria team of mother and daughter volunteered to make 500 bierocks to be sold to game spectators.

The Black Knights also conducted a gun raffle as a fundraiser. Katelyn Schmidt has been the primary contact person for the event. A host of volunteers were enlisted to fill all the positions needed for the day. Last year's event drew over 3,000 people.
